AHI is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that works closely with local homeless shelters and providers to ensure everyone has a place to call home. AHI owns and operates 702 units of supportive housing at six sites in Phoenix. Each year, more than 750 men, women, and children who previously experienced homelessness, have a safe and affordable home with access to supportive services to achieve housing stability.

The mission is to assist individuals and families to attain self-sufficiency through the provision of dignified housing and services.

Our vision is to provide housing to 1000 individuals every 1000 days, aiming to achieve this milestone by the year 2030.

Collins Court features 103 studio apartments, 13 one-bedroom apartments, and a community kitchen, a community room, and resident computer with internet access.

North 17 features 6 one-bedroom apartments and 36 two-bedroom apartments. Also offered is a shaded playground and programs for school-aged children.



# THOSE WE SERVE




AHI serves highly vulnerable, extremely low-income individuals, including individuals with multiple physical and behavioral disabilities.

Individuals experiencing homelessness in Maricopa County is on the rise and so too is the demand for affordable housing.

AHI is committed to being a solutions-oriented partner in ending homelessness. We provide permanent supportive housing—combining affordable housing with case management and supportive services to address the needs of extremely low-income individuals, including those who were previously chronically homeless and living on the streets.

AHI's programs are rooted in a whole-person approach that meets individuals where they are by focusing on activities that support resilience and self-sufficiency. Based upon the principles of Housing First, Harm Reduction, and Trauma-Informed Care along with proven best practices such as motivational interviewing and critical time intervention, we provide services that promote stabilization, inclusion, and wellness. Our services are designed to address the multitude of challenges our residents face such as financial instability, food and housing insecurity, mental and behavioral health issues, physical health concerns, substance use, and connection and access to the community and other service providers.



### THE GAP

In Arizona only 26 affordable and available homes exist for every 100 extremely low-income individuals/families in need of housing - resulting in a gap of 136,032 affordable and available homes.\*

Arizona's shortage of adequate housing leaves enough of our fellow community members in need of a place to call home to more than fill the stadiums for Arizona's NFL, MLB, and NBA teams combined.

Helping us navigate these challenging and changing times is the focus of AHI's Board and leadership team. In the coming months, AHI will add another 36 units of housing and 50 units by year's end. We are also under contract to acquire a 95-unit motel and are seeking funding. With this additional housing, we can more robustly respond to our community's need to end homelessness.

AHI is making a difference. With your support, we can and will do more. Everyone should have a place to be. The unsheltered homeless challenge in Maricopa County can be solved. As a community, we have the know-how, the resources, and the properties. Now, we just need the "will" to make it happen.
